EXHIBITIONS

The 142nd Annual Exhibition of Painting and Sculpture was held in the Galleries from January 26th through March 2nd, with a Private View on Saturday evening, January 25th from nine to eleven P.M.

The Fellowship Annual Exhibition of Oils, Sculpture, Water Colors, Pastels and Black and Whites was held in Galleries K, L, and M from March 15th through April 6th, 1947, opening with a tea on March 14th from three to five-thirty P.M.

An exhibition of Contemporary Chinese Painting was held from April 11th through April 20th, 1947.

The Student Exhibition held in conjunction with the Competition for the William Emlen Cresson Traveling Scholarships was on view in Gallery F from May 22nd through June 1st, opening with excercises for the students and their friends on the afternoon of May 21st at four P.M.

An exhibition of Paintings Looted from Holland returned through the efforts of the United States Armed Forces was held from June 5th through the 22nd.

During the summer months all of the galleries were hung with selections from the Permanent Collection and were dismantled on October 27th to prepare for the hanging of the 45th Annual Water Color and Print Exhibition and the 46th Annual Exhibition of Miniatures.

4) SCHOOLS

The Winter School sessions were very successfully conducted with a constantly increasing attendance which has quite reached our physical capacity.

The Chester Springs School was very successfully operated for a period of twelve weeks, June 19th through August 30th. The enrollment was the largest experienced in many years.

The Summer School at Broad and Cherry Streets was again carried on for a period of six weeks, June 16th through July 26th.

A very sizable proportion of the student body in all of the branches of our activities listed above is traceable to the G. I. Bill of Rights and the caliber of work emanating from these very earnest students has been most gratefying to the management and the faculty.

5) BUILDINGS

MAIN BUILDING, Broad and Cherry Streets and ANNEX, 1834 Arch Street

The major item in renovation within the last year at Broad and Cherry Streets was the installation of a new freight elevator in the old elevator shaft at the West end of our building. The new elevator is hydraulic and electrically controled and satisfies in every particular the requirements as of State and City. It provides the Academy with an exemplary service with a lifting capacity of 4,000 pounds. This improvement was realized at a cost of approximately \$28,000.

Because of this unusual expense being added to the figure of \$21,126.21 expended in the last fiscal year for the work accomplished in repairs and improvements to the roofs in the East end of our building, the Board of Directors, at their meeting of December 8, 1947, authorized the borrowing from any bank or banks such sums, not exceeding \$50,000, as may be required to pay the cost of repairs now completed for this corporation.

An additional toilet fixture was added in each of the boys' and girls' wash rooms in the school at Broad and Cherry Streets and new metal cubicles were installed with these new and relocated fixtures.

The re-shelving and general re-arranging of the Supply Room in the basement in the Northwest corner of the building.

The relocation of books from the small room over the Director's office to Vault 3, and the re-decorating of that room for an office for the Director of Public Relations.

No major renovations were necessary at 1834 Arch Street and only general maintenance and normal repairs were accomplished.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1948 - BUILDINGS (cont.)

CHESTER SPRINGS, Pennsylvania

The major expenditure above normal maintenance at Chester Springs was the installation of a deep freeze unit in the kitchen and a new motor unit in the old cold box in the pantry of the boys building. The exterior and interior work was again accomplished by the crew from Broad and Cherry Streets in the Spring of the year.

GENERAL

Through the suggestion and activity of the new Director of Public Relations, a gratefying increase of coverage in magazines and papers has been accomplished and a very gratefying increase in the memberships, as listed elsewhere in this report, have combined to show a total increase in attendance in the Academy Galleries of 21% over the year 1946.

7) LIBRAGRY

Miss Martha Schick, at her desk in the Library, continued to watch the lending and return of books and the general care of the library in lieu of a regular Librarian. The Clipping Files on artists have been carried on in a curtailed manner and only in that time when Miss Schick has been able to devote her personal time to this project.

8) PRINT COLLECTION

There has been no Curator of Prints throughout the year and this department has not been active. However, selections from our collection have been on view in the galleries at times throughout the year when our Permanent Collection was shown.

The thanks of the Management of the Academy are extended to the President and members of the Board of Education and to the Veterans' Administration for sending promising students to our Schools, and to the newspapers and magazines for their intelligent criticisms and general inclusion of items of news relating to the Academy.

Acknowledgment is also made to all the employees of the Academy for the faithful performance of their duties.
